HONORARY EXHIBITS TEJ BAHADUR CHITRAKAR

Tej Bahadur Chitrakar was born in 1898 in Patan, a predominantly Buddhist town in the Kathmandu valley. His family was part of the Chitrakars, a small community of Newar ethnics who were entrusted by the state to perform art-related tasks for temples, shrines, or festivals. The Chitrakar clans were expected to learn art to perform these obligations. Tej Bahadur grew up in the house of the ruling "Thakali" of Bhimsenthan, where religious art activities were always buzzing. His curiosity led him to understand the ethos of religious art and observe individuality in the rigid tradition. The clan of Bhimsenthan was known for its fine workmanship, and the rudimentary art of photography was introduced. This unique situation led to Tej Bahadur's imagination, leading him to paint more like photos or as seen by the naked eye. This began a new era in the making, introducing 'Natural Realism' in Nepal. By 1918, Tej Bahadur decided to dedicate himself more to learning art, despite his obsession with drawing.



In the final installment of this series, "Ancestor at Work" captures Tej Bahadur Chitrakar engaged in the ritual color coating of a wood-carved image meant for a temple or shrine strut. Typically, such images in struts are meticulously painted to depict the carved deities according to iconographical details. A yet-to-be-painted tympanum is seen resting on his left wall, and two struts are positioned on the right.

The artist incorporates familiar elements in each painting, such as earthen-colored pots, straw mats, and raw wool mats, sourced directly from his own household. Another consistent feature is the depiction of a dimly lit environment, where Chitrakar strategically places certain elements in shaded areas, creating a captivating dramatic effect. The source of light is always focused solely on the main subject.

Executed in the later stages of his artistic journey, these paintings stand as some of Tej Bahadur Chitrakar's most representative works. They showcase his matured taste for subject matter, an ability to fictionalize compositions, and, above all, consummate technical skill in rendering them in pictorial form. The execution of an authentic ambiance within the subject matter attests to the exceptional quality of these works.



The triad symbolizes the past, present, and future of the world, depicted in a cyclical form resembling the Chakravyuha - the Spiral of Existence.

The central bay features Shristikanta Lokesvara, surrounded by Hindu deities and celestial entities. The Torana above features Uma Maheswor, surrounded by revered deities. The window's design evokes limitless grandeur and embodies Nepalese culture and spirituality, offering inspiration to artists and admirers.

Singh explores a concept in Buddhism, a philosophy that encourages minimalism and detachment from materialism, through her installation art. The artwork questions consumerism and its impact on society, using materials that promote sustainability and ecofriendliness. The aim is to encourage viewers to consider the environmental and spiritual costs of their choices.

The artist uses shadow art to express their concept of repurposing and discarded clothing, highlighting the impermanence of material possessions. The installations draw attention to the shadow in the form of Buddha during his first sermon, inviting viewers to examine their consumption patterns and embrace simplicity. Her work challenges the status quo, questions the ethics of fast fashion, and invites us to rediscover the beauty of simplicity and inner peace that comes from embracing a life with less material clutter.

The monsoon rain reminds the artist of their childhood, with friends and friends singing and dancing together during the sun-shower. The piece represents and celebrates Nepali folklore and culture, appealing to a wide range of audiences. The palette of color creates the effect of a sun-shower, and the artist showcases their creativity in character design using Papier Mache and discarded items. The mural aims to carry the artist's childhood monsoon memories throughout their life, showcasing their creativity and capturing the essence of the story.

She holds an arrow, a Damaru, a knife, and a mudra of generosity. Her left hands hold a lotus blossom, a bow, a trident, and a skullcup. She wears a tiara made of five skulls, gold earrings, bracelets, anklets, and a necklace of fifty heads. She sits on a sun disc and lotus seat, with her foot on a flower blossom. Her serene posture is surrounded by the flames of pristine awareness, creating a powerful representation. She is a semi-wrathful form of the compassionate goddess Tara showcasing the destructive process involved in achieving enlightenment.

Legend has it that she would appear in human form to play dice with Jaya Prakash Malla, but stopped due to the lewd thoughts of the king. In a dream, she told the king she would enter into Goddess Kumari, a prepubescent girl with thirty-two auspicious qualities. The painting creates an intimate environment in the king's bedchamber, revealing her beauty through soft features and adornments. The painting also features weapons hanging on the bedroom wall, reflecting precautions taken against conspiracies and strife.







The practice of Chakrasamvara is central to the Newar Vajrayana and Tibetan Buddhist traditions, Devotees engage in rituals, visualizations, and mantra recitations to deepen their connection with Chakrasamvara.

It addresses issues caused by excessive rain and involves Bahidyah Bwayegu, a ceremony involving Dipankara Buddha and paubha paintings in sacred courtyards. This painting, created from 2018 to 2023, captures the essence of this ceremony and the memory of the Dipankara Buddha. The painting showcases hanging Bodhisattvas, chaitya, and paubhas, surrounded by other Buddhist deities and offerings. The painting encapsulates the richness of Newar Buddhist culture and preserves traditions for generations.

Tantric practices are deeply connected to the journey towards enlightenment. The Sri Saundarya Lahari, also known as Yantra Sarvasva, is a section of the Sri Yantra where Lord Shiva instructs Goddess Parvati about the sacred tenets and dimensions. Understanding Shiva is crucial to enlightenmentTo comprehend Shiva, one must recognize and embody Shakti, a characteristic denoted as Prakasha and Vimarsha. Shakti is seen as an energy of creation, cosmic force, or inherent energy within us. The Sri Yantra is composed of nine interlocking triangles, with the central triangle representing Shiva and the Bindu representing the latent embodiment of the goddess. Through meditative techniques, enlightenment can be achieved.

Manjusri, the Bodhisattva of Wisdom, is depicted on a lotus throne, holding the sacred scripture "Prajna paramita" and a flaming sword. According to the Svayambhu Purana, he and his consorts, Varada and Mokshada, migrated from Wutai San mountain to the lake Kalidaha, now Kathmandu Valley. They drained the lake to create a place for human beings to practice meritorious acts for perfect enlightenment. Wisdom, compassion, and skillful means to benefit all sentient beings are considered qualities of the fully enlightened mind. To attain Buddhahood, one must be perfect on the six perfections, with wisdom being the major perfection. Manjusri Bodhisattva is also worshipped as an image of speech by Newa Buddhists in Kathmandu Valley. His mantra, "Om Namo Vagisvaraya," is believed to enhance memory, writing, and explaining capacity.

The Haku Patashi, a traditional uniform for the Newari female community, is a symbol of unity and identity. The artist's portrait painting explores the enigmatic nature of this traditional attire, concealing the subject's face and allowing the viewer to imagine themselves as a sister or daughter. The subtle red powder falling from the subject's hand signifies the fading tradition, while the dark background leaves a void. The artist selectively reveals only a fraction of the subject, enhancing the enigmatic quality and highlighting the diminishing presence of traditional attire and its impact on cultural heritage.

The art installation serves a critical purpose of preservation, reminding viewers to measure themselves against the values, respect, and love they hold for their roots. 'Mana Pathi' is more than an exhibition; it's a call to honor our cultural lineage and celebrate the beauty of our heritage.

The artwork will be itched with four elements, earth, water, air, and fire, to introduce Buddha's philosophy of truth in a simple way. The artwork aims to re-introduce Buddha's teachings to the public.


